

# DURING OLIVER'S FIRST THREE WEEKS AT THE MICAH HOUSE. WE COULDN'T GET HIM TO SLEEP IN A BED.

Like most street kids, his days and nights were reversed. Oliver's second wind came just as everyone else went to sleep. After David, our night caregiver, set Oliver up with sheets and a blanket on the couch, the two of them would watch episodes of Oliver's favorite cartoon, a Japanese series called Dragon Ball, until Oliver fell asleep. At some point, however, he woke up long enough to move to the floor, and the next morning that's where we would find him, wrapped head-to-toe in his blanket like a mummy—exactly the way street kids sleep.

God used the national quarantine to bring Oliver to the Micah Project, which was a bright spot in an otherwise difficult time. In downtown Tegucigalpa all foot traffic disappeared and all stores closed. Begging was impossible in the empty city plazas, and street kids went hungry. The first week of the quarantine, our social worker, Wendy, drove to Tegucigalpa's central plaza to distribute food to those who lived there. As she stood by our van door and talked with people lined up for food, Oliver hopped into the van and announced, "I'm coming out

to the Micah House with you today!" By the time Wendy drove back to Micah, Oliver was in such a deep sleep that we had to carry him inside: his first night as a Micah boy!

It broke her heart that Oliver, as a young child living with an older group of street youth, had undergone some of the most degrading experiences of any boy that she had ever met on the streets. And yet he always ran up to her and demanded that she sit next to him and read stories from the picture-book Bible that he knew she

carried in her backpack. Afterwards, he asked probing questions about God. Gradually, a little boy began to emerge from his hardened shell of street life.

Over several months, God continued to put Oliver in Lucy's path. Even as she did errands on her days off, she ran into him in surprising places. During those unexpected encounters, he hopped into her car, and she would take him to the grocery store or to McDonald's for a Happy Meal. One kid in a city of more than a million inhabitants—yet, the Holy Spirit kept bringing them together all the while revealing to Lucy how much this child needed love.

When any new kid comes into the Micah House, he always shakes up the family dynamics. Sometimes, when our high school guys are deeply involved in an online class with their physics or algebra

teacher, Oliver, yelling at full volume like one of his cartoon superheroes, bounds into the living room. Usually, he approaches the older boys from behind to give them a bear hug without realizing that they are live on


video! Even though rambunctious little brothers can be annoying, the guys hug him back and let him sit with them as they concentrate on their lessons. The little street kid who desperately needed love now receives it on a daily basis.

Last week, Oliver found a YouTube video about how to draw his favorite Dragon Ball cartoon character, a warrior-hero named Goku. Though Oliver has never attended school, he spent three hours starting and stopping the

painstakingly following the instructions. When he was finished, he had a perfect rendering of Goku executing his signature superhero move: the kamehameha (pronounced kah-may-hah-may-hah).

I'm not surprised that Oliver loves Goku and his kamehameha super powers. Whenever Goku's enemies threaten to destroy him, he speaks this magical word and a burst of energy shoots from his hands to defeat evil in a blinding flash. Imagine if Oliver would have had kamehameha power while being the youngest and most vulnerable kid on the streets. With just one word, he could have defeated any evil person who attempted to corrupt his innocence.

Oliver doesn't need magical powers to stay safe at the Micah Project. Lucy began God's "protection process" when she read Bible stories to him on the streets; our greatest joy now is to surround Oliver with a power that will keep him safe from the evil that threatened to crush him, a power so great that "neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate . . . [him] from the love of God"

(Romans 8:38). As Oliver begins the slow, uneven process of healing from the deep wounds of street life, he will come to know that God's love is a areater power than anything that will ever threaten him again. Another positive outcome of the guarantine is that we have additional face-toface time to surround our boys with God's perfect love. Around the world, fear has been an overwhelming response to COVID-19 and its horrifying consequences. Most of our boys know what it's like to have everything taken from them; the pandemic has brought back memories of desperate times in their lives. Our goal is to create a safe place for them at the Micah House where they know that "perfect love drives out fear" (1 John 4:18).

Thank you for helping us provide a loving home for kids like Oliver. One reason that God's love is so powerful is the speed at which it multiplies; God uses your love to empower us to love these boys, and they in turn go out and share that love with others. You are an integral part of the unbroken chain that leads straight to the heart of God!

We pray that this story about the way God used Lucy, the Micah Project, and you to bring Oliver into his loving embrace will encourage you to remember that "perfect love drives out fear" and that "Christ lesus is the same yesterday, today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8).
