Tenacious Hope

The Micah Project Summer 2015

We desperately wanted to keep hope alive,

but the last time that Jerson left drug rehab before completing the program there, we were afraid that his life would take a dark turn. In the four years that he lived in the Micah Project, this young man had a very difficult time kicking his drug habit. He would do well for several months, but the bondage of addiction always carried him back to the streets.

The Micah Project is all about tenacious hope, and, even when Jerson left the Micah House, we refused to give up on him. We helped him to get into a drug rehab facility twice after he moved out, but the lessons he learned there could never seem to help him kick his addiction. In August of 2009, I wrote these words in an email to a friend who had been praying for Jerson: "I wanted to let you know that Jerson went back into rehab today. He had gotten about as low as you can go...he had gotten laid off from his job as a janitor and was really big-time back into the drug scene. He looked horrible too, gaunt with hollow eyes..."

Disheartening words about a young man who could just not seem to break those chains. That friend, though, along with many others, continued praying. They prayed for God's light to flood those dark areas of bondage in his life, even when he seemed to be beyond hope. And, a couple of years ago, those prayers were answered. Jerson rededicated his life to the Lord and began to experience the joy of freedom for the first time since he was a very young child. He began to record Christian music, and would spend many weekends at evangelistic events, sharing his testimony and his songs about his life. A few months ago, he got married to a wonderful young woman, and he got a job with one of the largest companies in Honduras.

On January 16th of this year, we celebrated the 15th anniversary of the Micah Project. We invited all of our grads back to the house; out of sixty boys who have called Micah home throughout the years, forty-nine of them were present that night! Jerson, who is twenty-seven now, got up before the group and said, "I give thanks to God, because he brought me back to life through the Micah Project."

While there are a few us of that have the tremendous blessing of walking with these boys day-by-day in Honduras, our mission would fail were it not for those of you that stand in the gap for us from afar. Your prayers move mountains, break chains, and bring freedom.

What about the remainder of the Micah 2.0 plans?

Through your awesome generosity, God blessed the Micah Project with the funds to complete the current facilities. In 2015, we have several projects underway: we are repurposing the original Micah House in order to launch the Isaiah House in August, and we are also purchasing a 30-passenger bus. We also continue to work on our perimeter wall, which nears completion and, as funds allow, we will begin to pave the entrance road into the Micah 2.0 property. Future plans include a more formal Technical school and educational facility, a house for our visitors and visiting teams, and a more formal development of our athletic areas and green spaces.

What are the current financial needs of The Micah Project?

Our most pressing need currently is for operational funds. Now that our ministry has grown, including a larger number of boys at Micah 2.0, the launching of the Isaiah House, and greater outreach to our surrounding communities, we are asking you to prayerfully consider giving towards our daily operations. We are committed to investing your donations directly into the lives that the Lord has placed in our hands!

What is the latest at The Micah Project regarding the transition to the new property at Micah 2.0?

2012 and 2013 were years of planning, building, and moving into the new Micah House, and 2014 was a year of settling into the new routines that came with the transition out to Micah 2.0. Though we intentionally limited our building projects last year, we still built a staff cabin for our missionaries John and Becca Bell, extended the perimeter wall with our visiting teams and completed various smaller projects. In 2015 our focus will continue to be our daily operations, as the Lord grows the scope and depth of our ministry!

What is the Isaiah House?

This new initiative of The Micah Project, spearheaded by our missionary Stephen Kusmer, is a repurposing of the previous Micah House to minister to the street population of young men who are too old for any other programs, typically 16 to 22 years old. For the last year it has served as a day facility for six of those young men. By August of this year, we will launch a full residential program that will include drug rehabilitation, job-training and intense discipleship. The theme verse of the Isaiah House is Isaiah 43:19, which states, "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert."
