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A WORD FROM **OUR DIRECTOR**

The Micah Project entered 2020 with a plan for a year-long celebration of our 20th anniversary, which was to culminate with a huge party in November to which you were going to be invited! Those plans changed overnight last March when the world shut down due to COVID-19. Facing a months-long lockdown here in Honduras, we also saw a growing number of kids and families on the streets, and neighbors who were no longer able to put food on the table due to the shuttered economy.

Even before the world shut down due to COVID-19, two out of three Hondurans were living in poverty*. 2020 only increased that misery as this impoverished country faced the combined threats of a health crisis, an economic crisis, and a political crisis. One thing become clear to us amidst so much tragedy: God had placed the Micah Project in Honduras for such a time as this.

Thanks to your generous donations to Micah's Love Our Neighbor Fund, we blessed thousands of families with food and basic supplies throughout the lockdown. We also redoubled our street ministry and as a result, eight boys left the streets behind and joined the Micah House. In August 2020, our staff began an intense, six-month process of strategic planning to answer the question: "With all of the recent changes in Honduras, how can the Micah Project continue to glorify God by helping this country and its people to flourish?"

This booklet will begin to answer that question. From rethinking our educational plan to launching a new program called Micah Works, you will see in these pages the many ways that your investment in these young people will continue to transform them through their Father's love. Thank you for being a part of that transformation!

RETHINKING EDUCATION

Many of our boys have lost years of school while living on the streets. At Micah, we have two seemingly contrary tasks of restoring their lost childhoods while also losing no time in helping them prepare for their future. Our home-schooling program offers K-10 education and the opportunity to attend a Christian high school for the last two years of school.







With all schools shut down, Honduras's September 15 Independence Day parades were cancelled. We decided to form our own marching band and cheer up our locked down neighbors on Independence Day!



After high school, many of our young men transition to our Timothy House in downtown Tegucigalpa to begin their college education.



TOOLS FOR LIFE

Not all of our young men will opt for college. Our new strategic plan places greater emphasis on technical and vocational training to provide as many tools as possible to become successful adults. We started new programs in the culinary arts, welding, carpentry, and agriculture in 2021, and will soon add others!

Micah grad Arle Mejia was working on a cruise ship in the Mediterranean before the pandemic hit. He moved back to Honduras, took over Micah's kitchen and inaugurated our culinary school! He is currently teaching five of our grads and all the boys in the Micah House.







MICAH WORKS!



We are thrilled to launch Micah Works after many years of planning and prayer! The idea behind this new program, inspired by Homeboy Industries in Los Angeles, is to provide a job to street youth 18-years-old and up, and, as they learn the value of hard work, to teach them the skills and habits they need to permanently step away from the streets. The Micah Project will rent small apartments and assign a navigator for each participant—a mentor to walk with them as they move toward a healthy, God-honoring future. After completing our year-long job training program, we will empower them to take their next step, which could be further vocational training, job placement, or even seed money to start their own microenterprise.

here in Honduras: water! In our newly built water purification building on Micah's campus, each participant will learn how to purify water, bottle it in five-gallon jugs, market it and deliver it in our community, and recover used bottles for sterilization. Then, rinse and repeat!

We are already planning Phase Two of Micah Works for 2022! As part of the Micah Project's ongoing street ministry, Micah missionary Michelle Corley has helped several street-connected young women take private lessons in hair styling/cutting and other skills related to cosmetology. We may


A girl dad! Micah grad Pedro

EN MEMORIAM



Every young person in our programs has suffered from a tragic mixture of abuse, neglect, addiction, violence and trauma before leaving the past behind to pursue a new life through the Micah Project. Sadly, due to the nature of the population we work with, there will always be the possibility of loss. Before 2020, we said goodbye to eight kids who lost their lives to the violence that is a part of everyday life in the streets and barrios of Honduras.

In 2020, we lost Elvin Meraz, a kid whose smile lit up any room he entered. Elvin spent much of his childhood deeply addicted to yellow glue and living on the streets. We were overjoyed when he chose to leave the streets behind in January of 2019. He flourished at the Micah Project, learning to read and write for the first time and becoming a much-loved member of our family. In 2020, the total lockdown imposed by Honduras during the pandemic, in which we were only allowed to leave our homes once every two weeks, was very hard on Elvin. In April, he asked to be reintegrated with his family in one of the most dangerous neighborhoods of Tegucigalpa. In August, he was kidnapped and killed by one of the criminal gangs that runs this city. While we believe in the hope of eternal salvation, Elvin's violent death has been hard on Micah's staff and boys. Please pray as we continue to heal from this profound loss.



Because Elvin's body was never recovered, we are developing a prayer garden on Micah's property in his memory.
